



THE PLASTIC SURGEONS OF SOUTHERN AFRICA AND THE HISTORY OF APRASSA:

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Section 1: The beginnings of Plastic Surgery in South Africa

International warfare and the two World Wars in particular did little to benefit Mankind, but they undoubtedly did play a role in the development of the speciality of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery.

Prior to World War 2, there were no recognised nor registered plastic surgeons in South Africa. Jack Penn, a graduate of the University of Witwatersrand Medical School in 1931, trained as a general surgeon in Great Britain. He also spent time in the United States, where he was exposed to some of the American pioneers of Plastic Surgery.

He returned to South Africa in 1937 to practice as a surgeon in Johannesburg and he joined the South African Medical Corps with an expressed interest in Plastic Surgery. When the second World War broke out, he was sent back to England and he spent most of 1940 learning plastic surgical techniques from the four British masters at the time – Harold Gillies, Archibald McIndoe, Pomfret Kilner and Rainsford Mowlem.

On his return to South Africa, with the assistance of the Oppenheimer family in Johannesburg, he established the Brenthurst Military Hospital for Plastic Surgery in their home. There, and later at the Tara Hospital, with the team that he assembled, he treated and operated on thousands of injured and burnt soldiers, airmen and military servicemen for the duration of the war.

After the war, Penn established a private plastic surgical practice in Johannesburg. He had built a special new private hospital for his and other surgeons' practices; with the Oppenheimer's consent it was named the Brenthurst Clinic.

Jack Penn later gained international fame when he went to Japan, and subsequently Israel, to teach and help the local surgeons manage their war casualties.

He was granted a Professorship in Plastic, Maxillo-Facial and Oral Surgery by the Dental Faculty of the University of the Witwatersrand. Whereas his rank in the South African Medical Corps throughout his war services years remained at Major, his post-war part-time Consultant post elevated him to a Brigadier.

South African's second plastic surgeon was Norman Petersen; unfortunately, very few details of his career are known. Like Penn, he spent much of the first year of the war in England gaining experience in the established plastic surgical units. On his return to South Africa he worked in Durban on war casualties at the Springfield Military Hospital, part of the King George V Hospital complex.

In 1945 he moved to Cape Town when he was appointed Plastic and Maxillo-Facial Surgeon to Groote Schuur Hospital. He also had a part-time private practice in the city, and he retired in 1961.

James Cuthbert trained first as a medical scientist in Cape Town, achieving a PhD. He then graduated as a doctor from the University of London, and was commencing a career in Orthopaedics in Edinburgh, when at the outbreak of the war, he was drafted into Harold Gillies' plastic surgical unit, where he remained until the end of the war. Thereafter he spent some time in Yugoslavia before arriving in Johannesburg in 1948 when he was appointed Plastic and Maxillo-Facial Surgeon to the Johannesburg group of teaching hospitals.

Cuthbert's first Registrar or trainee in plastic surgery was Dennis Walker, who had had a full training in general surgery. Walker registered as a plastic surgeon in 1954, officially took over as Head of the Plastic Surgery Department in 1967 and was made an Associate Professor the following year.

David Sydney Davies, a graduate of the University of Oxford in 1922, trained as a general surgeon in Britain and from 1929 to 1945 worked in Persia (now Iran), mostly in Teheran. After the war was over, he came out to Cape Town where he was appointed as an Assistant and later as a Registrar, to Norman Petersen.

He registered as a plastic surgeon in 1949, and remained on the staff of Groote Schuur hospital, as well as having a part-time private practice, until his retirement in 1960.

Bernard ("Barney") Franklin Bishop was the first plastic surgeon to open a private practice in Durban. A University of Cape Town graduate (in 1925), he had trained first in Britain as a general surgeon. He practised as a general practitioner in Kimberley as well as doing some surgery. His interest aroused by the developments in plastic surgery during the war, he went to Oxford in the early 1950's to qualify in the speciality, and he started in practice in Durban in 1953. He was given a part-time appointment at the Addington and King Edward VIII hospitals on a fee-for-service basis.

Thus by 1956 there were six registered plastic surgeons in South Africa – and they decided that the time was right to form some sort of professional association. Hence the Association of Plastic Surgeons of Southern Africa, the forerunner of the present Association of Plastic, Reconstructive and Aesthetic Surgeons of Southern Africa, came into being.

It should be noted that these initial plastic surgeons had had their speciality registered by the then South African Medical and Dental Council as 'Plastic and Maxillo-Facial Surgery'. From 1960 to 1965 the speciality was labelled 'Plastic Surgery', and from 1966 onwards as 'Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery'. Accordingly, the name of the Association was changed in 1971 to the 'Association of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons of Southern Africa', and again in 2016 to the 'Association of Plastic, Reconstructive and Aesthetic Surgeons of Southern Africa'.

In 1974 the South African Medical and Dental Council was expanded to become the Health Professionals Council of South Africa.

The initial Association of Plastic Surgeons was designated of 'Southern' rather than 'South' Africa (as with the subsequent name changes) in the hope that plastic surgeons from neighbouring countries might become members. This created a problem when the Association became part of the Medical Association of South Africa (MASA), in that MASA regulations at the time stipulated that members of a group within MASA, such as the Association of Plastic Surgeons, also had to be members of MASA.

Until recently there was in fact, only one non-South African plastic surgeon who became a member of APSSA. He was Bertram Owen-Smith, who practiced as a fully qualified plastic surgeon in Salisbury, Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) from 1957 to 1982 – but he first had to join MASA before he could become a member of APSSA. Owen-Smith's story is worth recording. At the beginning of the war he was training to be a pilot when the engines of the aircraft he was flying failed – and the aeroplane crashed. Owen-Smith was severely burnt, and for almost two years he was treated by and operated on, many times, by Archibald McIndoe and his team at East Grinstead.

When the war ended, Owen-Smith, so inspired by the work done by McIndoe, went to Medical School in London, then subsequently trained to become a plastic surgeon under McIndoe. Once qualified he commenced in practice in Salisbury, both in the private sector as well as providing an invaluable service to the State hospitals.

During his time there he did attend a number of the Association meetings and congresses. Towards the end of his career he became a member of the Rhodesian Parliament, but he returned to England when he retired in 1982.

Section 2: The founding of the Association of Plastic Surgeons of Southern Africa

On 4 August 1956, Jack Penn convened a meeting in Johannesburg (the venue was not recorded in the minutes) with four of the other five plastic surgeons in South Africa, namely Barney Franklin Bishop, James Cuthbert, David S Davies and Dennis Walker. Norman Petersen was unable to attend.

Penn gave an inaugural address in which he gave the reasons for calling the meeting, including the establishment of an Association of Plastic Surgeons. A constitution modelled on that of the British Association of Plastic Surgeons was adopted. Jack Penn was elected President of the Association and Dennis Walker the Secretary/Treasurer.

It was decided to invite a number of distinguished plastic surgeons from Great Britain and the United States of America to become Honorary members. The President would extend this invitation to Harold Gillies, Archibald McIndoe, Pomfret Kilner and Rainsford Mowlem, from England, and to Sterling Bunnell, James Barrett Brown, Robert Ivy and Jerome Webster from the USA.

Plastic surgeons in Southern Africa would be Full members.

Associate membership would be offered to medical or dental practitioners who were 'interested' in plastic surgery. Although there was a total of fourteen applications for this category of membership in the subsequent six months – which were approved – so little interest in the Association was taken by these Associate members in the coming years that by 1962, it was decided to terminate this category of membership.

Slightly over a year later, on 18 September 1957, the first Annual General Meeting of APSSA took place at Wentworth Hospital in Durban. It was attended by all six of the plastic surgeons in South Africa, and by an auspicious guest, Professor Pomfret Kilner from Oxford.

On the previous day, a ward round and a clinical meeting had been held, organised by Barney Bishop, at the Wentworth Hospital. In the afternoon papers were read by two of the surgeons, and further cases were presented.

Following the AGM there were further case demonstrations and discussions, and that evening the first Association of Plastic Surgeons dinner. Professor Kilner informed the members of the Association that the British Association of Plastic Surgeons would be presenting them with an engraved ebony and silver gavel, as he gave the best wishes of the British Association whom he represented, to the meeting.

Addendum: The Original Associate Members

It was reported at this first AGM in 1957 that there were fourteen Associate Members of the Association. They were:

Sidney Hersch, a general surgeon at the time, went onto train as a plastic surgeon, and was registered as such in 1961.

For the rest, this category of membership was done away with by 1962.

Section 3: The early meetings of APSSA 1957 to 1971

During this period, an Annual General Meeting was held nearly every year, but at irregular intervals. On a number of occasions, a clinical meeting with the presentation of papers by members was combined with the AGM.

In 1969 the AGM took place in Pretoria within a 5-day congress of the Medical Association of South Africa. On four of those days there were sessions of interest to plastic surgeons, and members participated in delivering papers and contributed to the discussions.

Section 4: The University Academic Departments and Divisions of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery

University of Witwatersrand

Although Jack Penn was appointed Professor of Plastic, Maxillo-Facial and Oral Surgery by the university in 1944, it was in the Dental and not the Medical Faculty; so the trainees in surgery in the teaching hospitals had no exposure to his teaching and experience. Penn also favoured the American system whereby Registrars or trainees could do at least part of their training in private hospitals or clinics as opposed to the State or University teaching hospitals, whereas the South African Medical and Dental Council would not accept this. Penn's practice was entirely in his private clinic, so the Council would not recognise any period of time trainees spent under his guidance and tutorship. Penn thus eventually gave up his Professorship by 1950.

In 1948, James Cuthbert was appointed Plastic and Maxillo-Facial surgeon to the Johannesburg group of teaching hospitals, and Dennis Walker was his first Registrar. Walker was registered by the SA Medical and Dental Council as a Plastic and Maxillo-Facial surgeon in 1954, and he took over as acting head of the division when Cuthbert died in 1964. He was appointed an Associate Professor in 1968 and retired in 1981.

Walker's successor as head of the division was John Legge who had done his specialist training in Ontario, Canada. Legge's tenure, however, was short-lived as he resigned in 1982 and emigrated back to Canada. A succession of newly qualified plastic surgeons acted as head of the division over the next eight years: Saul Braun (1982-85), Tom Ford (1985-87) and Anwar Kadwa (1987-90).

Donald MacKay, both medically and dentally qualified, returned from a Fellowship at Penn State University to take up a full-time post as head of the division. Within two years he had resigned and emigrated back to the USA. His successor was Colin Song until he too emigrated, to Singapore in 1997. George Psaras took over in 1998 as acting head, was officially appointed so and as an Adjunct Professor in 2002 and resigned in 2008 to emigrate to Cyprus.

Tim Christofides then took over running the division although he was never actually officially appointed as acting head. Elias Ndobe, on the other hand, was officially appointed, as well as being made an Associate Professor in 2012. Christofides was rewarded with an Adjunct Professorship in 2015.

Laurence Chait and Alan Widgerow were awarded Honorary Associate Professorships in 1999 for their many years of valuable contributions to the division. During his training Chait did a Hand Fellowship at the University of Louisville in the USA, as well as a Fellowship in Microsurgery with Bernie O'Brien in Melbourne, Australia.

He was the senior author of multiple publications emanating from his practice and the Wits department, including a world-first on the use of Botox in the management of the cerebral palsy hand.

In 2001 he was invited as the Kazanjian visiting lecturer to Harvard University to give a series of lectures. In the same year he was awarded the Fellowship by Peer Review of the College of Plastic Surgeons of South Africa, one of only three South African plastic surgeons so honoured.

University of Cape Town

In 1945, Norman Petersen was appointed head of the Plastic and Maxillo-Facial Unit at Groote Schuur Hospital. He was soon joined by David S Davies, first as Clinical Assistant and then Registrar.

He was registered as a Plastic and Maxillo-Facial surgeon by the Medical and Dental Council in 1949 and remained on the staff of Groote Schuur Hospital as well as having a part-time private practice until his retirement in 1960.

His son, also David Davies, was the next Registrar to be trained in Cape Town. He qualified in 1959 and was appointed to the staff of Groote Schuur and the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospitals. He started in private practice in 1960, and the following year was appointed the head of the department on the retirement of Norman Petersen.

Ken Dyer came down from Durban to take over from David Davies as head of the department in 1974 but returned to Durban the following year. His place was taken by Roger Strover, another Cape Town trainee, who had been in practice for the previous five years in Salisbury, Zimbabwe.

A contemporary of Roger Strover as a trainee in Cape Town, Cecil Bloch, gave up his private practice in the city to become full-time head of the department in 1980, and he was appointed an Associate Professor. On his retirement in 1998, Donald Hudson, already an Associate Professor on account of the multiplicity of his publications, succeeded Bloch as head of the department.

Des Fernandes was awarded an Adjunct Professorship for his many years of outstanding contributions to the department. The only doctorate achieved by a UCT trainee or staff members is a PhD awarded to Nick Kairinos.

University of KwaZulu Natal

The first plastic surgeon to start in practice in Durban was Barney Franklin Bishop. He had initially trained as a surgeon in Great Britain, had an FRCS, but practised as a general practitioner in Kimberley as well as doing some surgery. He did his formal training in plastic surgery in Oxford, and commenced practice in Durban in 1953. He was granted part-time appointments at the Addington and King Edward VIII hospitals, the two hospitals where registrars in general and orthopaedic surgery in the Surgical Division of the then University of Natal Medical School received their training. However, these hospitals were not recognised by the Medical and Dental Council for the training of registrars in plastic surgery until 1969, by which time three other plastic surgeons had joined the staffs of the two hospitals as part-timers - they were Michael Harris, John Youngleson and Ken Dyer.

Michael Harris had been a member of the South African Medical Corps from 1940 to 1947, and had worked under Norman Peterson at the Springfield Military Hospital. After a period in general practice he went to Oxford for his training in plastic surgery, and once qualified, joined Barney Bishop in practice in Durban in 1962.

John Youngleson and Ken Dyer had both been in general practice for a number of years before deciding to specialise. Youngleson did his plastic surgical training in Johannesburg and Odstock in England, whilst Dyer did his registrar time in Cape Town.

When Barney Bishop relocated to Pietermaritzburg in 1967, Michael Harris, as a part-timer, became head of the Sub- Department of Plastic Surgery, part of General Surgery within the University.

One of the first registrars to receive his training in Durban was Willie de Villiers - who then took over as a full-timer as head of the department from Michael Harris in 1977. De Villiers resigned at

the end of 1980 to go into private practice, and Warwick Morris acted as part-time head for slightly under two years until the appointment of Edward Bowen-Jones as full-time head.

Bowen-Jones, an Englishman, had trained in Manchester, and came out to South Africa with a missionary zeal in mind. He worked initially in Umtata, but was persuaded he could achieve far more of his ambitions in Durban. However, he resigned from his full-time post in 1991, and Anil Madaree succeeded him as full-time acting head.

Madaree had trained in Durban, did a Fellowship in the United States, and was awarded an Associate Professorship and Headship in 1994. He earned a unique distinction as a plastic surgeon in that he was later elected as President of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa, in which capacity he served from 2010 to 2013. He was also the President of the International Society of Craniofacial surgery from 2009 to 2011.

The Universities of Natal and Durban-Westville merged in 2004 to become the University of KwaZulu-Natal. The initial Sub Department of Plastic Surgery of the University of Natal went on to become the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery of the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

The Department is notable in comparison to those of the other Universities in that two of its members were awarded MD degrees (Alain Flamment and Edward Bowen-Jones) and three others earned a PhD (Anil Madaree, Mahendra Daya and Corne Nel).

Professor Madaree retired from the position of head of department at the end of 2023. He was given a part-time appointment until December 2026 to continue in a capacity as head of the Craniofacial unit.

Associate Professor Mahendra Daya was appointed as acting head of the plastic surgery department.

Warwick Morris was an active part-time member of the department for just over fifty years. He had had an exceptional training in that after being a registrar in both Johannesburg and Cape Town, he worked under Jack Penn and colleagues at the Brenthurst clinic for nine months before spending a year in the United States on Fellowships at the Universities of Michigan and Louisville; he completed his training in England in the unit in East Grinstead established by Archibald McIndoe.

When he returned to Durban at the beginning of 1975, he was given a part-time appointment in the department, and commenced private practice.

His greatest contribution to the department was in craniofacial surgery where he participated in every procedure undertaken by the unit in its first thirty years after he and Wolf Losken established it in 1976. For 15 years he also had a part-time appointment in the Division of Plastic Surgery of the University of the Witwatersrand where he helped set up the Craniofacial Service at the Johannesburg hospital.

Morris is one of only three plastic surgeons who were President of both APRASSA and the South African Society for Surgery of the Hand. He was one of the three plastic surgeons who were awarded the Fellowship of the College of Plastic Surgeons of South Africa by Peer Review. And he was one of the very few plastic surgeons who were active in their respective branch councils of the Medical Association of South Africa, serving on their Executive Committees, as Presidents and National Councilors, and being conferred with Loyalty awards and bronze medals.

Warwick Morris was South Africa's representative on EQUAM, the European Committee on Quality Assurance and Medical Devices in Plastic Surgery, based in Regensburg, Germany, from 1994 to 2007. For 45 years he was a member of the Medical Panel of the Natal Rugby Union and the Sharks, during which time, mostly at Kings Park in Durban, but also on occasions at Newlands, Loftus and Ellis Park, he sutured lacerations sustained during matches by literally hundreds of rugby players, not only from the home teams but also visitors from all over the rugby playing world. On his retirement, the medical suite at the Kings Park stadium in Durban was named the " Dr Warwick Morris Medical Room " in recognition of his services to rugby.

When his appointment on the staff of the University of KwaZulu-Natal came to an end after just over 50 years, he was selected as one of the University's " Living Legends ", an award made for " appreciation of extraordinary contributions to the School of Clinical Medicine and devotion to humanity ".

University of Pretoria

The first registered plastic surgeon in Pretoria was Pierre Hugo, an experienced general surgeon who had worked during and after the war with Jack Penn, and who did his formal training in plastic surgery under Archibald McIndoe at East Grinstead in England. Hugo was given a part-time appointment at the Pretoria General Hospital in 1959.

His first Registrar was Johannes Erlank, who registered as a specialist in 1970 and was appointed to the staff of what had then become the HF Verwoerd Hospital. Erlank took over as head of the division in 1972 when Pierre Hugo elected to go into full-time private practice with Jack Penn in Johannesburg.

Piet Coetzee, who had trained at Medunsa, took over as full-time head in 1987, and was awarded an Associate Professorship in 2002.

In 1997 the HF Verwoerd Hospital had its name changed to the Pretoria Academic Hospital. Coetzee retired in 2015 and Solly Selahle succeeded him as head of the clinical unit within the department of surgery. The hospital had been renamed the Steve Biko Academic Hospital in 2008. Selahle resigned in 2019 and his place as head was taken over in 2020 by Nkhensani Chauke-Malinga.

University of Stellenbosch

WDF ("Fana") Malherbe trained as a plastic surgeon in Amsterdam and subsequently at East Grinstead in England under Archie McIndoe.

He returned to Cape Town in 1960 and was given a part-time appointment at the Karl Bremer Hospital to start a plastic surgical unit under the auspices of the University of Stellenbosch Medical School. The unit was transferred with the Medical School to the Tygerberg Hospital in 1976.

Alastair Lamont, who had trained in Glasgow and Cape Town, was appointed full-time head of the department in 1981 and was awarded a full Professorship in 1984. He resigned from his post in 1988

and was succeeded by Ronnie Brink for approximately two years before Bennie Zeeman became full-time head in 1990, until his retirement in 2005.

His place was taken by Frank Graewe who had had an exceptional training before being invited to become the head of the department. After his five years as a Registrar at Tygerberg, Graewe did two Fellowships in France and another in the United States. He then worked in Munich for over three years during which time he was awarded a Doctorate by the Technical University of Munich. He took up the post at Tygerberg hospital at the end of 2005, was appointed an Associate Professor, but resigned to go into private practice in 2016.

Alex Zuhlke took over as acting head until the appointment of Professor Sammy Al-Benna in 2019. Professor Al-Benna has a PhD from his early training days. Wayne Kleintjes is the other University of Stellenbosch department of plastic surgery Consultant who holds the same qualification.

Mention must be made of Peet Van Deventer. Apart from his MBChB and his MMed (Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery) he has a BSc (Hons) and MMedSc. He has been a lecturer in Anatomy, Physiology and Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery for most of 50 years, from 1969 to 2018, mainly at the University of Stellenbosch, but also for a few years at the University of the Free State. He started his plastic surgical private practice in 1980 and in 2020 was still enjoying his profession.

It must also be recorded that Alastair Lamont, by visits every three months, provided a plastic surgical consultant service to Namibia from 1983 to 2014. When he relocated to Johannesburg in 1993, he also provided a similar service to Gaborone in Botswana from 1996 to 2016.

University of the Free State

Hume Maxwell trained as a plastic surgeon in Cape Town and started in practice in Bloemfontein in 1971, when he was granted a part-time appointment at the Provincial hospitals.

However, it was not until he was joined in 1975 by Heinrich Nikschat, who had had his training in plastic surgery in England, that their department was recognised by the Health Professions Council for the training of Registrars in plastic surgery.

JF ("Koos") Scholtz was their first trainee and when he qualified, he accepted an appointment to start a plastic surgical unit at Medunsa and the Ga-Rankuwa Hospital.

Ronnie Brink was appointed early in 1976 as full-time head of the department. Although he went into private practice after two years, he remained as acting head until Kobus van Zyl took up the post as a full-timer in 1987. Jannie Barnard was a second full-time appointee at that time.

Brink left Bloemfontein in 1988 to take over as head of the department at Tygerberg Hospital and Barnard followed him three years later.

Thus, when Kobus van Zyl died prematurely in 1996, Heinrich Nikschat took over running the department as a part-timer until the appointment of Wayne Smith as Professor and full-time head the following year. Smith resigned and emigrated to the Arab Emirates in 2000. Thus, Nikschat again acted as head, until Fred Jooste was appointed in a full-time capacity, and Professor, in 2003.

Jooste retired in 2019. His replacement appointed early in 2020, Corne Nel, is a remarkable academic in that he holds both a PhD and a master's degree in Public Health Education. He did his plastic surgical training in Durban, was a full-time Consultant there for a while, then went into private practice in Johannesburg until his appointment as head of the department in Bloemfontein, the University where he did his undergraduate medical degree.

Medunsa

The Medical University of South Africa was established in the Ga-Rankuwa Hospital complex north of Pretoria in 1976. Five years later the plastic surgery department was started with the appointment of JF ("Koos") Scholtz as Professor and Head.

Medunsa merged in 2005 with the University of the North to become the University of Limpopo. The Ga-Rankuwa Hospital had been renamed the Doctor George Mukhari Hospital two years previously.

Scholtz resigned in 2005 and emigrated to the Middle East. Over the next six years a number of surgeons headed the department for varying but short periods of time – Johan van Wyk, Yvonne Brakovsky, Danie Hoffmann, Stefan Rawlins and Solly Selahle. In 2011, Gysie Annandale accepted a full-time post as Professor and head of the department and he remained there until 2017.

He was succeeded by Kenneth Segwapa, who initially was acting departmental head and was then officially appointed in November 2019.

During Professor Annandale's tenure, the Health Sciences Faculty of the University of the Limpopo broke away and by 2015 was reconstituted as the Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University.

Walter Sisulu University

The Medical Faculty of the University of Transkei was established in Umtata in 1985, initially for undergraduate medical students only.

In 2005 the University of Transkei merged with the Eastern Cape and Border Technikons to become the Walter Sisulu University with Health Sciences as one of its four faculties.

With the progression to the education and training of medical postgraduates, the teaching platform of the Medical School in Umtata was expanded to include the East London and Port Elizabeth Provincial Hospital complexes.

In 2009, Chris Van der Walt, who had done his training at the Tygerberg Academic Hospital, was appointed plastic surgeon to the Port Elizabeth Provincial Hospital complex in the post previously held by Bertram Ah Chow – who had retired the previous year due to ill-health.

Van der Walt was assisted part-time for the first five years or so by the two plastic surgeons, Donald Solomons and Charles Apostolis, who had started in practice in Port Elizabeth in the late 1960's and who had provided a part-time plastic surgical service to the Provincial hospitals for the duration of their careers.

Van der Walt was authorised two Registrar posts in plastic surgery by the Health Professionals Council and the first trainee qualified and registered in 2015. She was thus the first plastic surgical post-graduate of the Walter Sisulu University.

Thus, successful candidates for the Fellowship in Plastic Surgery from 2001 can append the letters - FC Plast Surg (SA) - behind their names, whereas from 1977, when the Fellowship in Plastic Surgery was first offered, to 2000, the letters - FCS (SA) - had to be used.
FCS(SA):	Fellow of the College of Surgeons of South Africa. Up to 1976 the Fellowship examination could only be taken in general surgery.
Fellow:	A period of additional training after completion of the prescribed years as a Registrar. Fellowships are offered by certain University programmes (mostly in the USA), internationally famous individuals and certain distinguished hospitals.

FRCS:	Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons. There are four Royal Colleges of Surgeons in Great Britain and Ireland – England, Edinburgh, and Ireland and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. Those who have passed the Fellowship Examinations of one or more of the Colleges may append after their names the letters - FRCS (Eng), FRCS (Ed), FRCSI and FRCS (Glasg) or FRCS (G). FRCS(C) or FRCSC:	Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada
